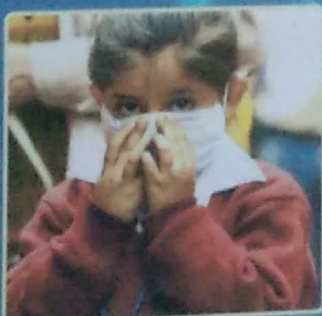
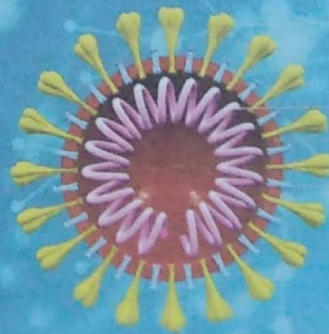
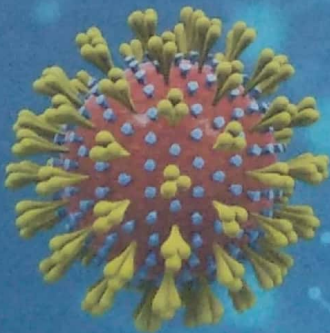

THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC :

The COVID-19 pandemic, also known as the corona virus pandemic, is an ongoing pandemic of corona virus disease 2019 (COVID-19), caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome corona virus 2 (SARS-CoV-2). The outbreak was first identified in Wuhan, China, in December 2019, The World Health Organization declared the outbreak a Public Health Emergency of International Concern on 30 January, and a pandemic on 11 March. As of 12 Sep 2020, more than **28.50 MILLION** cases of COVID-19 have been reported in more than 188 countries and territories, resulting in more than **916,000 deaths**. More than **1.93 MILLION** people have recovered from the virus.

The virus is primarily spread between people during close contact, most often via small droplets produced by coughing, sneezing, and talking. The droplets usually fall to the ground or onto surfaces rather than travelling through air over long distances. Less commonly, people may become infected by touching a contaminated surface and then touching their face. It is most contagious during the first three days after the onset of symptoms, although spread is possible before symptoms appear, and from people who do not show symptoms.

Common symptoms include fever, cough, fatigue, shortness of breath, and loss of smell. Complications may include pneumonia and acute respiratory distress syndrome. The time from exposure to onset of symptoms is typically around five days but may range from two to fourteen days. There is no known vaccine or specific antiviral treatment. Primary treatment is symptomatic and supportive therapy.

Recommended preventive measures include hand washing, covering one's mouth when coughing, maintaining distance from other people, wearing a face mask in public settings, and monitoring and self-isolation for people who suspect they are infected. Authorities worldwide have responded by implementing travel restrictions, lockdowns, workplace hazard controls, and facility closures. Many places have also worked to increase testing capacity and trace contacts of infected persons.

The pandemic has caused severe global social and economic disruption, including the largest global recession since the Great Depression. It has led to the postponement or cancellation of sporting, religious, political, and cultural events, widespread supply shortages exacerbated by panic buying, and decreased emissions of pollutants and greenhouse gases. Schools, universities, and colleges are currently closed either on a nationwide or local basis in 185 countries, affecting approximately 98.5 percent of the world's student population. Misinformation about the virus has spread online and through multiple news networks, and there have been incidents of xenophobia and discrimination against Chinese people and against those perceived as being Chinese or as being from areas with high infection rates.



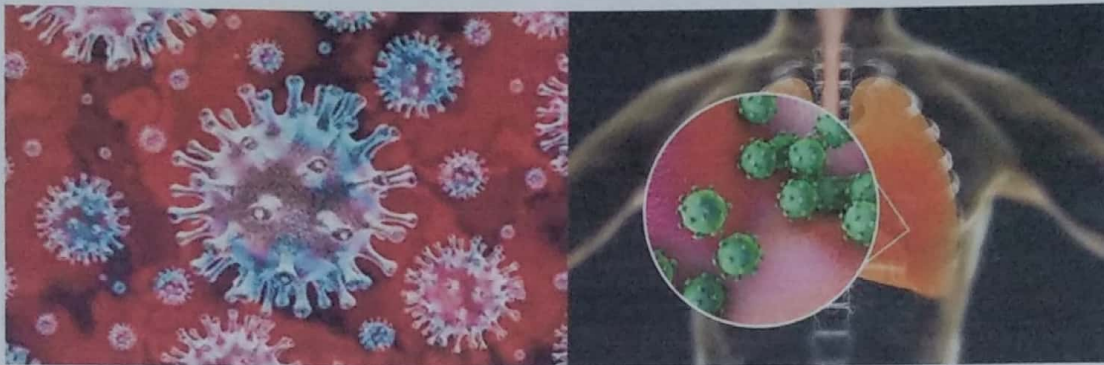

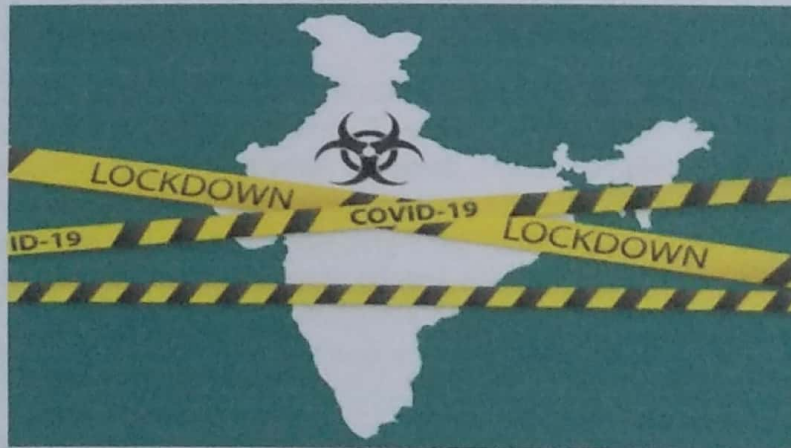

COVID-19 PANDEMIC LOCKDOWN IN INDIA :

On 24 March 2020, the Government of India under Prime Minister "NARENDRA MODI" ordered a nationwide lockdown for **21 days**, limiting movement of the entire 1.3 billion population of India as a preventive measure against the COVID-19 pandemic in India. It was ordered after a 14-hour voluntary public curfew on 22 March, followed by enforcement of a series of regulations in the country's COVID-19 affected regions. The lockdown was placed when the number of confirmed positive corona virus cases in India was approximately 500. Observers stated that the lockdown had slowed the growth rate of the pandemic by 6 April to a rate of doubling every six days, and by 18 April, to a rate of doubling every eight days.



As the end of the first lockdown period approached, state governments and other advisory committees recommended extending the lockdown. The governments of Odisha and Punjab extended the state lockdowns to 1 May. Maharashtra, Karnataka, West Bengal, Andhra and Telangana followed suit. On 14 April, Prime Minister **NARENDRA MODI** extended the nationwide lockdown until 3 May, with a conditional relaxation after 20 April for the regions where the spread had been contained.



On 1 May, the Government of India extended the nationwide lockdown further by two weeks until 17 May. The Government has divided the entire nation into three zones—green, red and orange—with relaxations applied accordingly.

On 17 May, nationwide lockdown was further extended till 31 May by National Disaster Management Authority.

ECONOMIC IMPACT OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC IN INDIA :

The economic impact of the 2019-20 corona virus pandemic in India has been largely disruptive. The World Bank and credit rating agencies have downgraded India's growth for fiscal year 2021 with the lowest figures India has seen in three decades since India's economic liberalization in the 1990s. However, the International Monetary Fund projection for India for the Financial Year 2021-22 of 1.9% GDP growth is the highest among G-20 nations. Within a month, unemployment rose from 6.798 on 15 March to 26% on 19 April. During the lockdown, an estimated 14 Crore (140 million) people have lost employment. More than 45% of households across the nation have reported an income drop as compared to the previous year.

The Indian economy was expected to lose over **Rs.32,000 Crore (US\$4.5 billion)** every day during the **first 21-days of** complete lockdown, which was declared following the corona virus outbreak. Under complete lockdown, less than a quarter of India's \$2.8 trillion economic movement was functional. **Up to 53% of businesses** in the country were projected to be significantly affected. Those in the informal sectors and daily wage groups are the most at risk. A large number of farmers around the country who grow perishables are also facing uncertainty. Various businesses such as hotels and airlines, are cutting salaries and laying off employees.

Vendor of greens, essential supply chains and logistics. Life under lockdown. Major companies in India such as Larsen & Toubro, Bharat Forge, UltraTech Cement, Grasim Industries, Aditya Birla Group, BHEL and Tata Motors have temporarily suspended or significantly reduced operations. Young startups have been impacted as funding has fallen. Fast-moving consumer goods companies in the country have significantly reduced operations and are focusing on essentials. Some defense deals have been affected/delayed due to the pandemic.



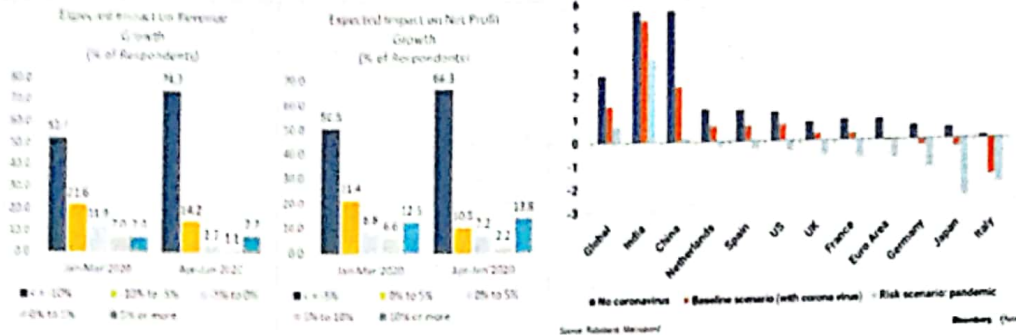

The World Bank and Asian Development Bank have approved support to India to tackle the corona virus pandemic. On 14 April 2020, the Prime Minister of India extended the lockdown to 3 May. A new set of guidelines for the calibrated

opening of the economy and relaxation of the lockdown were also set in place which would take effect from 20 April. On 17 April, the RBI Governor announced more measures to counter the economic impact of the pandemic including **Rs. 50,000 crore (US \$7.0 billion)** special finance to NABARD, SIDBI, and NHB. On 18 April, to protect Indian companies during the pandemic, the government changed India's foreign direct investment policy. During the next five days the Finance Minister announced the details of the economic package.

An outbreak of **COVID-19** impacted the whole world and has been felt across industries. The outbreak is declared as a national emergency by the World Health Organization. In India the three major contributors to GDP namely private consumption, investment and external trade will all get affected. World and Indian economy are attempting to mitigate the health risks of COVID-19 with the economic risks and necessary measures needed will be taken to improve it.

Along with a decline in an economy, comes subsequent loss of employment. In wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, approximately 52 percent of the firms foresee job losses in their respective sectors post lockdown. According to a CII survey, around 46 percent of the respondents believe that the pandemic will have no major impact on the job market and therefore no expectations of job loss. Majority of the firms expect less than 15 percent job loss whereas 32 percent expect job losses to be in the 15 to 30 percent range. The repercussions on the job market will only be evident once the lockdown ends.

Though the Central Government has allowed transportation and distribution of essential services during the lockdown, many issues had to be fixed to ensure smooth inter-state transportation. Most of the firms engaged in the production of essential products and supply of ancillary goods faced issues such as constrained operations in production & supply of those goods, access to manpower, and movement & distribution of products.

MIGRANT WORKERS DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC :

Indian migrant workers during the COVID-19 pandemic have faced multiple hardships. With factories and workplaces shut down due to the lockdown imposed in the country, millions of migrant workers had to deal with the loss of income, food shortages and uncertainty about their future. Following this, many of them and their families went hungry. Thousands of them then began walking back home, with no means of transport due to the lockdown. In response, the Central and State Governments took various measures to help them, and later arranged transport for them.

Migrant workers are mostly from rural areas but live most of the year in cities for work. Many have no savings and lived in factory dormitories, which were shut due to the lockdown. Additionally, there is no central registry of migrant workers, despite the existence of the Inter-State Migrant Workmen Act, 1979.



Maharashtra has the largest number of migrants, according to the 2011 Census of India. The State Government imposed a lockdown on 20 March in Pune, Pimpri-Chinchwad, the Mumbai Metropolitan Region and Nagpur, leaving the migrant workers with no work. Thousands then gathered at the train termini and bus stations, seeking transport to their hometowns. With the nationwide lockdown, all transport facilities were closed.

According to government reports, there was enough food grain stocked up in the FCI godowns to feed the poor for at least a year-and-a-half. While government schemes ensured that the poor would get additional rations due to the lockdown, the distribution system failed to be effective as the ration cards are area-specific and fair price shops were largely inaccessible. Additionally, the 'One Nation, One Ration Card' system has been implemented in very few states, as of mid-April. While the scheme allowed migrant workers to retrieve food grains for free anywhere across the country, very few are aware of the scheme. In addition to this, the scheme also requires biometric authentication, which was discontinued due to fears of spreading the virus through common fingerprint sensors.

ISSUES GUIDELINES FOR STATE GOVERNMENTS :

Migrant workers, tourists, students and other people stranded in different parts of the country were on Wednesday allowed to move to their respective destinations with certain conditions, giving a big relief to the distressed people. In an order, Union Home Secretary Ajay Bharath said buses shall be used for transport of such groups of stranded people and these vehicles will be sanitized and will have to follow safe social distancing norms in seating. The Home Ministry order, however, did not specify whether a person or a family can travel in a private vehicle, and if allowed, under what conditions. **"Due to lockdown, migrant workers, pilgrims, tourists, students and other persons are stranded at different places. They would be allowed to move,"** he said in an order issued to all states and union territories.

Listing the conditions, the ministry said all states and union territories should designate nodal authorities and develop standard protocols for receiving and sending such stranded persons.

The nodal authorities shall also register the stranded persons within their states and union territories, it said. In case a group of stranded persons wish to move between one state and union territory and another state and union territory, the sending and receiving states may consult each other and mutually agree to the movement by road. The moving persons would be screened and those found asymptomatic would be allowed to proceed, according to the Home Ministry. The states and union territories falling on the bus transit route will allow the passage of such persons to the receiving states and union territories, it said. On arrival at their destination, they would be assessed by the local health authorities, and kept in home quarantine, unless the assessment requires keeping the persons in institutional quarantine, the order said.

The union home secretary issued the order in his capacity as the chairperson of the National Executive Committee under the Disaster Management Act. The Home Ministry also said the guidelines of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare on home quarantine should be followed by the authorities concerned. The decision of the central government will be a big relief to several lakh migrant workers, students, tourists and other people who are stranded in different parts of the country. Several states, including Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Gujarat, Punjab, Assam, Chhattisgarh and Rajasthan, have brought back thousands of their students and tourists stuck in different parts of the country by bus. However, most of the migrant workers, tourists and other people continue to stuck in their places of work or shelter homes. While Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Punjab, Assam, Gujarat and Chhattisgarh brought back their stranded students from Kota in Rajasthan, Punjab has brought back stranded pilgrims from Maharashtra, besides students from Kota. A group of around 360 stranded people of Rajasthan is also being brought back from Assam. While transporting these students, pilgrims and other people, the states have used buses and other vehicles.

There have been at least three protests by migrant workers in Surat in Gujarat in recent weeks as they have been demanding passage to their home states. A few hundred people had also gathered about a fortnight ago in Bandra in Mumbai after being influenced by rumors that trains would ply to North India. However-, the Bihar government has been seeking the strict implementation of the lockdown, saying that people should remain wherever they are during the entire period of the lockdown. While announcing the lockdown, Prime Minister "**NARENDRA MODI**" had said people should remain wherever they are. In the beginning of the first phase of the lockdown, thousands of the migrant workers have started moving by foot from cities like Delhi, Mumbai and Hyderabad to their respective places, creating a humanitarian crisis. This led to the Home Ministry directing the state governments not to allow the migrants to move, arrange shelter homes for them and provide them food. The states were also allowed to even use money from the National Disaster Response Fund for providing food and shelter to the migrant workers. The desperation of the migrant workers was such that the police found a group of migrant labourers, who were travelling from Andhrapradesh to Rajasthan, inside a container truck in Maharashtra.

The government has already allowed industrial activities in rural areas with conditions. Similarly, apart from the shops for the essential commodities, standalone business establishments of non-essential goods were also allowed to open during the Lockdown. However, markets, malls, restaurants, parlour, liquor shops continue to remain shut. The lockdown was first announced by the prime minister on March 24 in a bid to combat the corona virus pandemic.

MIGRAINE WORKER IN TAMILNADU:

The Tamilnadu government has asked the urban and rural local bodies to provide shelter and food to the migrant workers. The instructions were also issued for maintaining proper hygiene and social distance at the temporary shelters.

While state borders were sealed and the movement of private and public transportation was curtailed, the state government has asked its elected representatives in the border districts to attend to the concerns of the stranded migrant labourers.

The ongoing lockdown, in the wake of the covid-19 pandemic, has affected the lives of some of the most vulnerable communities across the country, such as migrant labourers, waste pickers, single mothers, artisans and sex workers. It is to cushion the impact of the crisis on these sections, and to ensure their access to essentials, that **NOT-FOR-PROFIT ORGANISATIONS** are sending out appeals for funds. To help you aid these initiatives and connect you with efforts on the ground, the Lounge team has put together a list of verified NGOs, charities and private institutions, which are working towards this cause. Each of these projects has also been vetted on the basis of whether the volunteers involved practice the necessary government, health and safety guidelines while disseminating the material.



COVID-19 TESTING:

Two kinds of tests are available for COVID-19:

VIRAL TESTS & ANTIBODY TESTS:

VIRAL TEST: tells you if you have a current infection.

AN ANTIBODY TEST : tells you if you had a previous infection.

An antibody test may not be able to show if you have a current infection, because it can take 1-3 weeks after infection to make antibodies. We do not know yet if having antibodies to the virus can protect someone from getting effected with the virus again, or how long that protection might last.

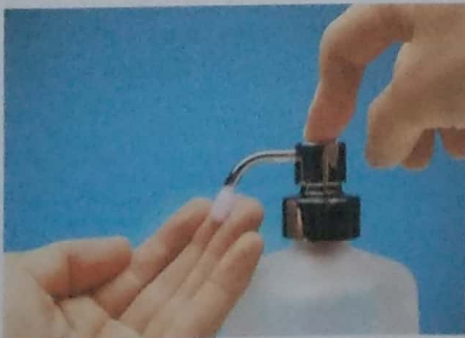
